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Sommario/riassunto	<p>Architect Ernesto Nathan Rogers (1909–1969) was a towering figure in twentieth-century Italian architecture. Through the work of his collaborative firm (Banfi Belgiojoso Peressutti Rogers, or BBPR), who were responsible for many of the most influential Italian projects of the time, and through the editorship of publications such as <i>Domus</i> and <i>Casabella</i>, Rogers ensured a lasting influence on the field.
