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| Sommario/riassunto  | Ordeals of Interpretation analyzes medieval ordeals, the reading of data<br>in the polygraph and some methods of torture, while reading texts like<br>Hamlet and Macbeth. This book describes the ambition for a<br>touchstone that demonstrates the veracity, or authenticity, of certain<br>entities. Note that touchstone - basanos - was a term used to<br>denominate the stone with which the quality of gold was tested in<br>commercial contexts, but which also designated the idea of testing,<br>torture and torturing. For the interpreters mentioned in this book, the<br>touchstone, which can be an object, a person or a test, would have the<br>ability to help us distinguish friends from enemies, to identify the<br>quality of some verses and to illuminate the truth. It is argued,<br>however, that the ability to make precise judgements derives from a<br>technical understanding of interpretation led by skilful individuals,<br>noting that the ability to discover "the truth" depends on each<br>examiner's skill, intuition, ability to learn a specific method or<br>technique, to detect errors and ask questions (important qualities in<br>the activity of a literary critic). |
