Poetic Presence and Illusion brings<br>together Krieger's speculation on literature and its effect on the reader.<br>The poem, Krieger argues, is an illusionary presence and an ever-<br>present illusion. It exists for the reader, like a drama before an<br>audience, only within an illusionary context. But the illusion should not<br>be taken lightly as a false substitute for reality. It is itself a real and<br>positive force: it is what we see and, as such, is constitutive of our<br>reality, even if our critical faculty de-constitutes that reality by viewing<br>it as no more than an illusion. The coupling of poetic presence and<br>poetic illusion serves to describe the relationship between poetry as<br>metaphor and the reader's sense of personal and poetic reality.
