The book reads Blackness in Scottish writing from the 1970s to the early 2000s, a period of history defined by post-imperial adjustment. Critiquing a unifying Britishness at work in Black British criticism,

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Jackson argues for the importance of Black politics in Scottish writing,
and for a literary registration of race and racism which signals a
necessary negotiation for national Scotland both before and after 1997.
