The purpose of the present book is to provide an introduction to this grammatical tradition not merely by summarizing it, but by putting it into a perspective that will make it accessible to any linguist trained in the western tradition. The reader

should not by put off by the word 'medieval': Arabic grammatical theory shares a number of fundamental similarities with modern linguistic
