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Sommario/riassunto	Erik Erikson (1902-1994) was one of the most eminent and prolific psychologists of the 20th century. Over his long career he published a dozen books, including classics such as <i>Childhood and Society</i> ; <i>Identity, Youth, and Crisis</i> ; and <i>Young Man Luther</i> . He was awarded the Pulitzer Prize and the National Book Award in 1970 for his biography <i>Gandhi's Truth</i> .
