Southern consuls were cut off from the legation in Washington, D.C., and confronted their problems for the most part without direction from

superiors. Consuls in the North sought assistance from the British foreign minister and followed the procedures he established.

Diplomatic relations with Great Britain eased tensions in the North; the

British consuls in the South were expelled in 1863. Eugene H. Berwanger uses
