In particular the book examines the link between politics and prevention. Did the varying political regimes influence the styles of precaution adopted? Or was it. as Peter Baldwin argues, a matter of more basic differences between nations, above all their geographic placement in the epidemiological trajectory of contagion, that helped shape their responses and their

basic assumptions about the respective claims of the sick and of society, and fundamental political decisions for and against different
