Critical race studies has not come up with good answers to this guestion because it has overemphasized the visuality of race. According to dominant theories of racial formation, we see race on bodies and persons and then link those perceptions to unjust practices of racial inequality. 'Racial Worldmaking' argues that we do not just see race. We are taught when, where, and how to notice race by a set of narrative and interpretive strategies.
