Sommario/riassunto	"In the first part of the twentieth century few women in western Canada had careers as artists--Pauline Boutil had three: 23 years as a fashion illustrator for the Eaton's catalogue for the graphic design company, Brigidens of Winnipeg, 27 years as the Artistic Director at the Cercle Moliere Theatre and 70 years as a visual artist. Born in Brittany in 1894, Boutil painted in a traditional style and trained at the Winnipeg School of Art, the Cape Cod School of Art, and at l'Academie de la Grande Chaumiere in Paris, France. She left an important legacy of portraits,

landscapes, still lifes, and illustrations as well as theatre sets and costume designs. This English translation of Louise Duguay's award-winning "Pauline Boutil: Destin d'artiste 1894 1992" shares the story of an important artist who lived an exceptional life."--
