Sommario/riassunto	Martina Bofulin offers a fine-grained analysis of complex relationships, practices and representations of Chinese migrants from Qingtian who live in Slovenia, but maintain active and manifold ties with their place of origin in southeast China as well as with friends and family living in Europe and beyond. Through her intensive multi-sited ethnographic research she reveals the opportunities and constraints at both ends of migration process that shape the everyday experiences of this group. The book ('Home and away: Chinese migration to Slovenia') goes beyond the mechanistic explanations of migration pull and push factors and describes a complex mix of migration regimes, discursive spaces, forms of consumption, family practices and individual imaginations blurring the line between home and away. Martina Bofulin v monografiji analizira proces priseljevanja kitajskih državljanov v Slovenijo na prelomu dvajsetega v enaindvajseto stoletje. Besedilo osvetljuje kompleksne odnose, prakse in reprezentacije najštevilnejše populacije med priseljenci iz Ljudske republike Kitajske

v Sloveniji – Qingtiancev, ki sedaj živijo v Sloveniji, vendar ohranjajo stike in vzdržujejo prekomejne aktivnosti, ki obsegajo tako kraj izselitve, torej Qingtian na jugovzhodu Kitajske, kot tudi številne lokacije priselitve v Evropi, pa tudi drugje. Na podlagi dolgoletne veprizorišne etnografske raziskave avtorica pokaže na priložnosti in prisile na obeh straneh migracijskega procesa ter na izvirne odgovore Qingtiancev, katerih prakse in strategije so utemeljene v preprianju, da je prostorska mobilnost tudi družbena.

Sommario/riassunto

Speaking at West Point in 1962, Dean Acheson observed that Britain had lost an empire and had still to find a new role. This book explains why, as Britain's Labour government contemplated withdrawal from east of Suez, ministers came to see that Britain's future role would be as a force within Europe and that, to this end, and to gain entry into the European Economic Community, a close relationship with the Federal Republic of Germany would be essential. This account of Anglo-German relations during the 1960s reveals insights into how both governments reacted to a series of complex issues and why, despite differences that might have led to strains, a good understanding was maintained. Its approach brings together material covering NATO strategy, détente and European integration. The main argument of the book is reinforced by material drawn from British and German primary sources covering the period as a whole, from interviews with some of Harold Wilson's key advisers and from newspaper reports, as well as from a wide range of secondary publications. The introduction of material from German sources adds to its authenticity. The book contributes to what we know about Cold War history, and should help to redefine some of the views about the relationship between Britain and Germany during the 1960s.
