Sommario/riassunto

This collection of essays investigates the fundamental role that the loss of colonial territories at the end of the Ancien Régime and post-World War II has played in shaping French memories and colonial discourses. In identifying loss and nostalgia as key tropes in cultural representations, these essays call for a re-evaluation of French colonialism as a discourse informed not just by narratives of conquest, but equally by its histories of defeat.

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
