Sommario/riassunto

Finally social issues such as education and the development of a healthy future generation are addressed. Child Refugee and Migrant Health is a hands-on resource for anyone who cares for children, assessing and addressing their health and psychological needs, in the best way possible, with the available resources, in any setting. There is a strong focus not just on caring for refugee and migrant children in crisis situations, but also on their families, long term physical and mental health.

Sommario/riassunto	<p>Écrit avant 1385, le Livre du bon Jehan duc de Bretagne de Guillaume de Saint-André est sans doute le premier grand texte d'envergure de l'histoire et de l'identité bretonnes. Avec ses quelque cinq mille vers octosyllabes à la gloire du duc Jean IV, couvrant les années 1341-1381, il constitue une des principales sources pour la guerre de Succession, complétant, en particulier pour la période entre les deux paix de Guérande, les chroniques de Jean le Bel et de Froissart qui lui sont contemporaines, et les autres auteurs bretons n'ont pas manqué de le piller. Il fait même connaître des événements extérieurs à la Bretagne : en Anjou, en Périgord ou à Paris, durant la première année du règne de Charles VI. On ne disposait jusqu'à présent que de deux éditions, partielles et anciennes, de ce texte, celle de dom Lobineau (1707) et celle d'Ernest Charrière (1839), qu'était venu compléter un premier essai de transcription, par les auteurs du présent ouvrage, d'une partie restée inédite : le "Jeu des échecs moralisés", paru en 1996 dans les Annales de Bretagne et des Pays de l'Ouest. Ce nouveau travail se présente comme la publication du texte complet, avec l'intégralité des variantes de la tradition. La transcription, présentée de façon synoptique, est accompagnée en regard d'un essai de traduction destiné à rendre ce texte ancien accessible aux lecteurs d'aujourd'hui, peu familiers de la langue française du XIV^e siècle. Une introduction approfondie, un lexique, un index et un plan aident aux repérages dans l'œuvre. Cartes, tableaux et photographies récentes complètent une abondante illustration puisée dans les corpus médiévaux et modernes, en écho à ces rimes six fois séculaires.</p>
